College Positive Activities preparing for Military Programs

MILITARY PROGRAMS

The Reserve Officer Training Corps prepares college students to be officers in the U.S. Armed Forces. These programs provide college tuition assistance, living stipends, leadership skills training, and more. Below are resources for ROTC programs that College Positive Volunteers can utilize when talking to youth about post-secondary options.

Students interested in a military career should visit the ROTC website at www.rotc.com to learn the career options available after college. Selecting the top link, “Which Military Branch?” will lead you to a brief description of the skills and opportunities in each program discussed below.

U.S. ARMY ROTC

Four-year, three-year, and two-year scholarships are awarded based on your academic years remaining to complete college. Visit <http://www.goarmy.com/rotc/scholarships.html> for tuition scholarships and living expenses available to ROTC students. Selecting the “High School Students” or “College Students” links in the Enrollment Information will lead you to specific scholarship requirements, commitment to the U.S. Army, and frequently asked questions.

To search all colleges, select “Find Schools” on the left toolbar, at the link displayed above.

ARMY NATIONAL GUARD

The Army National Guard also offers scholarships for full time college students. This includes tuition, a stipend for books, and a monthly allowance. Students may also receive additional pay with participation in the Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP), which warrants participation in the Guard and a college ROTC program simultaneously.

U.S. AIR FORCE AFROTC

More than 1000 colleges and universities offer Air Force ROTC.

The AFROTC provides three- and four- year scholarships in three different types to high school seniors. All scholarship types include tuition fees, a textbook allowance, and a living stipend.

U.S. NAVY NROTC

High school students may apply for full-scholarship opportunities as early as the second semester of junior year. The full-scholarship includes tuition at institutions with NROTC programs, a stipend for textbooks, subsistence allowance, and NROTC program fees. Students enrolled in college may qualify for “advance standing” scholarship opportunities. More information about NROTC can be found at <http://www.nrotc.navy.mil/>.

U.S. COAST GUARD CSPI

The U.S. Coast Guard offers a scholarship program called the College Student Pre-Commissioning Initiative (CSPI). Colleges designated as serving minority populations offer this program to students; links to accredited schools can be found at the website stated below.

This opportunity is solely for college sophomores and juniors due to the expectation of degree completion within twenty-four months of acceptance into the program. Like ROTC, this Coast Guard program offers tuition assistance, textbook stipend, as well as a salary during the student’s junior and senior year.
